WHAT IS COMMUNITY POLICING?

Community Policing is a strategy aimed at achieving more effective crime control, reducing fears of crime, improving quality of life, and improving police service and legitimacy. These goals are achieved through a proactive reliance on community resources, seeking to improve crime causing conditions. The police and the community are encouraged to work closely together to solve problems of crime, physical and social disorder, and neighbourhood decay.

WHAT ARE THE OBJECTIVES OF COMMUNITY POLICING?

- Establishing a partnership between police and the communities they serve, ensuring effective protection of communities and a better quality of life.
- Ensuring the police address the primary needs of the community, and are accountable to these needs.
- Enhancing the quality of information available to the police to develop a proactive and problem-solving approach to crime and violence.
- Providing communities with a visible and accessible policing presence.
- Enhancing the public's confidence in the police and deterring criminals.
- Aligning the values of the police organisation with those of democratic South Africa
- Inspiring police officers who can interact sensitively with their communities and in a manner that respects local values.

WHAT IS A COMMUNITY POLICE FORUM (CPF)?

A Community Police Forum is a group of people from a community and police representatives who meet to discuss safety problems in their community. They aim at ensuring police accountability, transparency, and effectiveness in the community. CPFs are established in terms of section 19(1) of the S.A.P. S. Act, Act 68 of 1995.

THEREFORE, public participation and attending the community meeting, is the essence of the CPF.

Safety Tips: When at home (courtesy of the Gauteng Department of Community Safety)

- Make sure your home is secure
- Know your sector and emergency numbers and have them displayed in an accessible area
- Always let someone know where you are going and how long you will be gone
- Avoid displaying valuables where criminals can see them
- Report suspicious behavior
- Know your neighbours
- Know more about your domestic workers before you employ them, make sure you keep their ID copy with you
- Double check that you have locked and secured all windows and doors before leaving home and when going to sleep
- Do not leave gardening tools outside in your yard that could be used for burglary (stepladders, spades)
- Do not buy stolen goods, they might be from armed robberies
- Do not allow unidentified government employees into your yard.
- Inform your neighbours and relatives when going to town or leaving the province or of your whereabouts
- Ask your neighbours to switch on and off your lights when away



DOG poisonings are on the rise

Be informed - **KEEP YOUR DOGS INSIDE AT NIGHT**

Even if you have to keep them in the garage or any available enclosed space, **PLEASE** do not leave them exposed.

2 Step/Temik is the most common poison used on dogs. It's an insecticide that's easily purchased and highly toxic. Only a small amount is needed to kill a dog or cat.

What should I do if I suspect my pet has been poisoned?

You need to get your pet to the vet as fast as you can - If treatment is started early, the prognosis for recovery is good.

Is there anything I can do at home if my pet is poisoned?

- Not really. You need to get your pet to the vet as quickly as you possibly can, and no time should be wasted.
- Phone your vet's rooms while you are on the way and let them know you have an emergency, that you suspect poisoning.
- Q: Can activated charcoal help my pet? A: Maybe, but it is in no way a treatment for poisoning.
- To buy more time, you can give your pet activated charcoal if you have it at home. This will only have an effect if your pet is showing very mild clinical signs. Don't waste time doing this: do it fast and still hurry to the vet. The activated charcoal is **NOT** a treatment, but it may buy you a little extra time. If your dog is already vomiting, it won't have any effect, as it will only be regurgitated.

Signs and symptoms

These poisons are extremely fast acting (excepting some of the anticoagulants) and deadly, even if your dog only ingested a small amount. Even if you catch your dog in the act of ingesting the poison, there is no time to waste. Don't wait for your dog to display symptoms. Take action immediately

- Disorientation
- Vomiting
- Confusion
- Excessive salivation & coughing up slime
- Excessively runny nose
- Hyperventilation
- Lethargy
- Difficulty breathing
- Convulsions & seizures
- Diarrhea: may be mucous; may be black or "tarry" in the case of anticoagulant poisoning
- Abnormal pupils - either pinpoint or dilated
- Tremors and muscle twitching
- Temporary or partial paralysis, partial loss of movement
- Unconsciousness
- Coma
- Bleeding, from nose, gums, wounds
- Acute blindness in the case of anticoagulants
- Blood in the urine in the case of anticoagulants



The poison almost looks like poppy seeds. It is extremely toxic and will poison any human or animal who comes into contact with it. If you see what looks like Aldicarb on your property, do not touch it with your bare hand - the poison can be absorbed through the skin. Wear gloves when removing the poison from your property. Criminals usually hide it in meat so that dogs consume it
